IN MEMORIAM

MARY COLLEEN TICKNER

December 10, 1927 - July 6, 2016



This summer the Vancouver music community lost a beloved and distinguished member, Mary Tickner. With a career spanning more than sixty years, her philosophy and talents influenced countless students and colleagues. Her love of teaching combined with her sense of humour, her infinite patience and her deep respect for both her students and the works they played made her a truly unique educator.

Mary was born in Indiana to supportive, musically inclined parents. The family always had a piano but she did not begin lessons until they were required as therapy after an accident involving her hand and arm. She took to the instrument immediately and had various teachers until her early teens. After deciding that lessons in and of themselves were "boring", she continued on her own, learning whatever pieces she fancied while playing for local churches and choirs.

When the time came to further her education, Mary entered a private college as a singer. In return for a scholarship and her skills as an accompanist, she was given the opportunity to study piano as well as voice. It was here, in her third year of the program, that she was first introduced to pedagogy. The next semester, she started a few students ... and she was hooked! After graduating, she made her way teaching, accompanying, and conducting before deciding to do a Masters in Education at USC.


Once her Masters was complete, Mary was soon in high demand. She worked in Pasadena creating audio programs for classroom teachers and became an Associate Professor at State College in Long Beach where she taught piano, class piano, conducting, and music appreciation. After three years she earned the title *Master Teacher for Music Education*.

Mary and her husband French immigrated to Canada in the early 60's. Eager to embrace the opportunities available in her new homeland, she began teaching at UBC in 1964 where she remained until her retirement twenty-eight years later. She joined the Vancouver BCRMTA in 1980 and quickly became an invaluable resource, serving as an executive member, an advisor, and a newsletter contributor until the spring of 2014. With her sterling reputation as an adjudicator, she travelled within Canada innumerable times, and she was a featured clinician in high profile festivals in both India and Hong Kong. In July 2013, the CFMTA recognized Mary's exceptional abilities with the *Hugheen Ferguson Distinguished Teacher Award*; she was both proud and deeply honoured by the acknowledgement.

In her final months, Mary's mind remained as bright and as receptive as ever. She welcomed visitors and she was always interested in hearing about musical events or students. Even as her strength failed, she strove to articulate new ideas for her pedagogy articles. For those left behind, eighty-eight seems too early for someone with her flair for life, but with a year for each key on the piano, it was nevertheless an appropriate point for a pianist to take a final bow.

Brava Mary Tickner! ~ a true lady with a great heart who will be sorely missed by all.

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




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MEET OUR KEYNOTE SPEAKER & ADJUDICATOR OF THE BC PIANO COMPETITION

DR. PETER MACK

Irish pianist Peter Mack is in great demand as a performer, clinician, convention artist, adjudicator, and teacher. Celebrated for his moving playing, and his easy rapport with audiences, he has performed throughout the United States and Europe, as well as in Australia, India, and the former Soviet Union. He is the winner of the New Orleans, Young Keyboard Artists, and Pacific International Piano Competitions. His prize in the Sherman-Clay competition included a Steinway grand piano. Naturally, he is a Steinway artist!

Peter Mack is well known for his extensive repertoire, having performed twenty-six concertos with orchestras. A choral scholar at Trinity College Dublin, and a fellow of Trinity College London, he has a doctorate in piano performance from the University of Washington. His principal teachers were Frank Heneghan and Bela Siki.

In 2013, Dr. Mack received the extraordinary honor of being asked to deliver both the Advanced Piano Masterclass at the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) annual convention in California and the Masterclass for MTNA Winners at the biennial National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy (NCKP) in Illinois. His students are frequent winners of local, national, and international competitions. He is the proud teacher of nineteen MTNA national finalists, and two MTNA national first place winners.

A former board member of MTNA, Peter Mack was the chair of the MTNA National Conference Planning Committee for the 2014 Chicago conference. In 2015, he was selected as an MTNA Foundation Fellow, a program that "honors deserving individuals who have made significant contributions to the music world and the music teaching profession."

Peter Mack's 2014-2015 list of engagements includes performances in two of the most acoustically perfect performance spaces in Europe: the Salle Cortot of the Ecole Normale in Paris, and the Haydnsaal of the Esterhazy Palace in Eisenstadt, Austria. Dr. Mack is Professor of Piano Performance at Cornish College of the Arts in Seattle.




DAVID COLLINS

With experience in music education, commercial music production, as well as composition for short films and TV, David taught piano from his home in Bristol, UK, before moving to Kelowna, BC in 2011. There, he ran a music school of 160 students, operating the Yamaha Music Education System and Music for Young Children. Alongside the school, David sold acoustic and digital pianos and continued to share his passion for music technology and education. David strongly believes in the importance of music education for everyone and now works as a Piano Product Manager for Tom Lee Music in Vancouver.

PETER FRIESEN



Peter Friesen was raised in a musical family in Yarrow B.C., second youngest of 7 children. His father was a violin maker. Most of his brothers and sisters played instruments, flute, violin, piano and classical guitar. Peter began piano lessons at age 6 when his father traded one of his violins for a piano. Peter paid for his lessons by mowing his piano teacher's lawn. At age 12, he decided to become a rock star after seeing pictures of Rick Wakeman and thinking Rick looked like Jesus.

By 14, Peter was playing in bars and restaurants and highschool stage band. In 1979 Peter was awarded the Louis Armstrong Jazz Award for his involvement in the Sardis Senior Secondary School Jazz Band. While in his senior year, Peter skipped out of school on a regular basis to hitchhike to Vancouver and attend Jazz concerts. Oscar Peterson, Ella Fitzgerald, Joe Pass and George Benson were some of the notable concerts attended.

In 1980 he attended David Thompson University Centre in Nelson B.C. There he studied with David Rogosin. It was in Nelson where Peter began his teaching career in 1984 at the local music store. After David Thompson University was shut down in 1984, Peter continued his studies with Vancouver jazz pianist Bob Doyle. Getting to his lesson involved commuting by Greyhound bus 12 hours to his monthly lesson in North Vancouver and another 12 hours back to Nelson. Peter developed an allergy to the bus.

Peter attended Capilano College's Commercial Music Program in 1986 to finish his Diploma. While at Capilano College his studies continued with Bob Doyle and also Ted Collins. Peter is continually seeking new perspectives and is continuing his studies with Bob Murphy.

Since his arrival in Vancouver in 1986 Peter has continued teaching private lessons and played piano at weddings and corporate events. He has been presenting teacher workshops since 2008. Peter has written several self-published books on lead sheet arranging. His pieces have been played at festivals and Canada Music week celebrations. Peter lives in Richmond with his wife and two children and Daisy the little white dog.

DR. SEAN HUTCHINS

Dr. Sean Hutchins is the Director of Research for The Royal Conservatory of Music. He serves as the head of The Royal Conservatory's new research centre, focusing on experimental studies of music education, development, performance, and cognition. He received his Ph.D. from McGill University in 2008, and is trained in experimental psychology and neuroscience, with a specialization in the field of music cognition. Dr. Hutchins has held positions at l'Université de Montréal, working in the International Laboratory for Brain, Music and Sound Research (BRAMS) and the Center for Research on Brain, Language and Music (CRBLM), as well as at the world-renowned Rotman Research Institute at Baycrest Hospital in Toronto. Dr. Hutchins is considered to be a world expert in the science of vocal perception and production; his work has studied the factors that affect basic singing ability and the relationship between speech and singing. He has been published in several prestigious journals, including the



Journal of Experimental Psychology, Brain & Language, and Music Perception. In the popular media, his scientific work has been profiled in the Wall Street Journal, NBC, Scientific American Mind, and CBC Radio, among others. He is also on the faculty of the Department of Psychology, Neuroscience, and Behaviour at McMaster University.

DR. JANET LOPINSKI



Dr. Janet Lopinski, Senior Director of Academic Programs at The Royal Conservatory, has performed as soloist and collaborative pianist, and has presented lectures, workshops and master classes across North America, Europe and Korea. She is a graduate of The Royal Conservatory (ARCT Gold Medalist), University of Toronto (Bachelor of Music) and University of Cincinnati (Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts). She has taught piano, piano pedagogy, music history and theory at The Royal Conservatory and is co-author of the music history handbook "Explorations", published by the Frederick Harris Music Company. Dr. Lopinski is the Founder and Artistic Director of the Canadian Chopin Society.

DON LUM

Don Lum has been teaching violin for over thirty-five years. Beginning his studies with Douglas Stewart, Don has received training in Canada as well as the United States. As both a performer and educator, Don remains active as a chamber musician, most recently being the Concertmaster for the Vancouver Sinfonietta; in addition, Don regularly acts as an adjudicator for music festivals, as well as working as an examiner for the Royal Conservatory of Music. He is also the annual strings co-ordinator for the Festival on the Lake.

As a clinician, Don has presented workshops in Western Canada pertaining to violin technique. Of particular importance to him is the prevention of injury; correcting bad form and posture is one extent of his expertise. Don takes pride in his work, using his knowledge and experience to develop emerging talent.

Don's students have been prizewinners of local, provincial and national awards. His students have also gone to study at prestigious institutions, including the Peabody Conservatory, the Eastman School of Music, the Mannes School of Music as well as the Cleveland Institute of Music. Currently, one of Don's former students is the principal second violinist with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra.

LUCINDA MACKWORTH-YOUNG



A leading pedagogue in the UK, and Director of the Piano Teachers' Course, EPTA UK, Lucinda Mackworth-Young is an international lecturer, workshop leader and pianist who helps teachers and performers follow their own intuition, develop multisensory skills, and teach what, and how, pupils want to learn.


Realising that the quality of energy, or relationship, between teachers, pupils and parents and between performers and audiences is at the heart of music making, Lucinda specialises in putting psychology into relevant and practical forms for music teaching, learning and performing. Also, with the aim of helping everyone play spontaneously at home, in schools or social settings (and say "Yes!" when asked to play Happy Birthday!) she has developed a wealth of easy to access, musically satisfying material for playing by ear, improvising and accompanying songs, step-by-step.

She has had numerous articles and chapters published in American and British music teaching publications, and her first book: Tuning In Practical Psychology for Musicians came out in 2000. Her most recent book, Piano by Ear: Learn to play by ear, improvise and accompany songs in simple steps was published by Faber Music in 2015 and was shortlisted for the Music Teacher Awards for Excellence, 2016.

DR. SASHA STARCEVICH

Pianist Sasha Starcevich is currently enjoying a very rewarding career as an international performer and teacher. Since receiving his Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from Yale University in May of 2003, he has continued to thrill audiences here in the United States, Canada and Europe.

Starcevich has given recitals at New York's Carnegie Recital Hall, Moscow's Tchaikovsky Hall, Windsor Castle, and in London's Wigmore Hall. His solo recital there in May of 2002 was met with much critical acclaim, and a review in the Musical Opinion wrote: "The repertoire was brilliantly conceived; a thoroughly enjoyable recital at every level". Most recently he has given solo recitals and concerto appearances in Europe, and played a four hand piano recital with Peter Frankl. He has performed a solo recital in the Teatro Pavone in Italy, and recently gave lectures, recitals, master classes and pedagogy workshops in Singapore.



As a soloist he has performed with orchestras throughout Canada, the United States, Europe, China and also toured Russia with the Samara Philharmonic Orchestra, and has performed at several international festivals such as the Henley Festival in England and Holder's Season in Barbados. Starcevich has recorded for CBS Television in the United States and has released two CD's under the Britstar label in the United States and the Jacques Samuel Label in London, England. His principal teachers have included Ilana Vered, Peter Frankl, Jane Allen, Donna Fishwick and Boris Berman.

Dr. Starcevich has been affiliate professor of piano at the State University of New York, and department chair of music and professor of piano at the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts. He currently maintains an active private studio in Bellevue, Washington, and is Artistic Director of the Showcase Piano Academy in Richmond, BC. In August of 2011, Dr. Starcevich joined the faculty of Musicfest Perugia, in Italy. He is currently an active faculty member and co-director of the Festival. This past Summer, he joined the faculty of the Cooper Piano Festival at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music.

His students have been prizewinners of local, national and international awards, and have gone on to study music at prestigious schools such as the Eastman School of Music, the Yale School of Music, the Mannes School, the Juilliard School in New York and the Peabody Conservatory. Dr. Starcevich is in frequent demand as a performer, adjudicator and presenter of Master Classes throughout North America, Russia and Asia.



Recognising that performance anxiety is pervasive, and that we, conventionally trained musicians, are often unable to play spontaneously in a friend's house or public place without our books, this session focuses on:

- What and how to play right now, without books, alone or with others, by ear, improvising and to accompany singing (including Happy Birthday!)
- > Identifying your psychological position when performing (Inner child? Critical parent?) and understanding what audiences really want
- > How to practise and prepare for a secure and musically satisfying performance that you, yourself, enjoy giving.
